RESOLUTION NO. 2019-03

A RESOLUTION CANVASSING THE ELECTION RETURNS AND DECLARING THE RESULTS OF A GENERAL ELECTION HELD ON MAY 4, 2019, FOR THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING MAYOR, COUNCILMEMBER PLACE ONE (1), COUNCILMEMBER PLACE TWO (2) AND COUNCILMEMBER PLACE FOUR (4).

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance 786-19 of the City of Willow Park, Texas adopted on January 8, 2019, a General Election was duly held on May 4, 2019, for the purpose of electing Mayor, Councilmember Place one (1) and Councilmember Place two (2) for full terms and Councilmember Place Four (4) for an unexpired term; and

WHEREAS, said election was held with the solemnities and formalities necessary to make it a valid election, all notices having been posted in the manner and for the length of time required by law; and

WHEREAS, only duly qualified resident voters of the City of Willow Park, Texas, voted at the General Election; and

WHEREAS, section 67.003 of the Texas Election Code, as amended, generally provides that each local canvassing authority shall convene not later than the eleventh (11th) day after the Election date for the purpose of canvassing the election results; and

WHEREAS, section 1.006 of the Texas Election Code, as amended, provides that if the last day for performance of an act is a Saturday, Sunday, or legal state or national holiday, the act is timely if performed on the next regular business day; and

WHEREAS, returns and tabulations from said election, attached hereto as Exhibit A, was received from the Parker County Elections Administrator as set out in the Joint Election Agreement signed and approved on January 8, 2019.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1.

That all of the findings contained in the preamble of this Resolution are found to be true and are adopted as findings of fact.

SECTION2.

It is officially found and determined (Exhibit A) that in said election, each of the candidates received the following votes during early voting and on Election Day:

Consider a Final Plat for The Reserves at Trinity Addition, being a 140.302 acre tract A. McCarver Survey, Abstract No. 910; W. Franklin Survey, Abstract No. 458; I. Hendley Survey, Abstract No. 619; M. Edwards Survey, Abstract No. 1955; and J. Froman Survey, Abstract 471, City of Willow Park, Parker County, Texas.

BACKGROUND:

W. P. D. Trinity LLC, proposes to subdivide this 140.302 acre tract of land. ORIDNANCE NO. 740-16 (October 25, 2016) passed by unanimous vote of the City Council provides PD Planned Development District zoning for the property. (SEE ATTACHED ZONING EXHIBIT) The Ordinance also provides Development Standards for the property. (SEE EXHIBIT B)

Phase I of the subdivision will include 91 single family residential lots, a 10.869 acre lot for the 208 unit, multi-family dwelling complex authorized in the PD (Lot 1, Block 10), and a 14.63 acre lot for development of 110 townhomes (Lot 2, Block 8). Meadow Place Drive a 60' right-of-way will be extended from Kings Gate Road northwest into the subdivision. It will terminate with a temporary turn around. Future development will extend Meadow Place Drive and connect to Crown Road. The residential lots will front on eight cul-de-sacs. "Bridge Street" will be constructed and connect this development to the Crown Point development. All street improvements will be constructed by the developer in accordance with City standards.

The subdivision will be served by City water and sewer. The developer will connect to the 12" water main in Kings Gate Road and extend along Meadow Place Drive extending water mains to the cul-de-sacs. The water main will extend to an easement in Block 11 to provide a looped system. Fire hydrants will be installed by the developer in accordance with I.S.O. regulations. Sanitary sewer service will be provided by extension of a 10" sanitary sewer main at Kings Gate Road. Sanitary sewer mains will be extended into the subdivision and extend northwest to the City's Waste Water Treatment Plant. Stormwater flows from the northeast to the southwest across the subdivision to the Clear Fork of the Trinity. The City's Engineer has reviewed and approved the improvement plans for the subdivision.

STAFF/BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

The Final Plat for The Reserves at Trinity Addition meets the requirements of the Subdivision Ordinance and Staff recommends approval.

The Planning and Zoning Commission recommends approval of the Final Plat. The Commission vote was unanimous.

ORDINANCE NO. 740-16

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR A CHANGE IN ZONING TO PD PLANNED DEVELOPMENT ZONING DISTRICT CLASSIFICATION AND USE DESIGNATION FOR THAT CERTAIN 140.3 ACRES OF LAND LOCATED IN THE A. MCCARVER SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 910, THE W. FRANKLIN SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 468, THE I. HENDLEY SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 619, THE M. EDWARDS SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 1955, AND THE J. FROMAN SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 471, ALL IN PARKER COUNTY AND THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Willow Park is a municipal corporation duly and legally formed in the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the City is a general law municipality with specific powers delegated to it to protect the health, safety and general welfare of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 211 TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE, the City of Willow Park has the authority to adopt comprehensive zoning plans and to amend said plans for the purposes of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the City; and

WHEREAS, the owner of that certain 140.3 acre tract of land described on Exhibit "A" attached hereto has applied for a change in zoning to "PD" Planned Development District consistent with the development standards and Site Plan attached hereto as Exhibit "B" and "C" respectively; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on the zoning change was held by the Planning and Zoning Commission of the City of Willow Park and a final report for recommendations was submitted to the governing body of the

City; and

WHEREAS, the City of Willow Park held a public hearing subsequent to that of the Planning and Zoning Commission and subsequent to receiving the final report and recommendations of the Planning and Zoning Commission with respect to the application for a zoning change; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the change is consistent with surrounding zoning as shown in the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, all requirements concerning notice to adjacent property owners, publication and other procedural requirements have been complied with in accordance with Chapter 211, TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE; and

WHEREAS, the City of Willow Park, Texas does hereby deem it advisable and in the public interest to grant the requested zoning classification: "PD Planned Development District" zoning district classification set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, the City of Willow Park has adopted a Comprehensive Plan for the long range development of the municipality and inclusion of the planned development district described herein is consistent with that long range plan.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION

The Mayor, or Mayor's designee, is hereby authorized and directed to implement the applicable provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2, LAND USE PERMITTED

The zoning district classification and use designation of the Property described in Exhibit "A" is hereby changed to "PD Planned Development District" zoning district classification and use allowing the use and development of the Property described in Exhibit "A" in accordance with the development standards on Exhibit "B" and the Site Plan on Exhibit "C". Exhibit "A", Exhibit "B", and Exhibit "C" are attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes.

SECTION 3. MAP AMENDMENT

The City Secretary is hereby directed to amend the official zoning map to reflect the adoption of the zoning approved herein consistent with markings as specified by Municipal Code of Ordinances of the City of Willow Park.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid by any court, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of other provisions or applications, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are severable.

SECTION 5. RECITALS

The City Council hereby finds and declares all precatory language herein to be true and correct and approves and adopts the same herein as part of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. PUBLICATION

The City Secretary of the City of Willow Park is hereby directed to publish in the official newspaper of the City of Willow Park the caption and the effective date of this Ordinance as required by Section 52.011 of the LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption by the City Council of the City of Willow Park and after publication as required by law.





Exhibit B PD Development Standards

1. Definitions.

- a. Accessory use means any use that is customarily incidental to the primary use of the property on which it is located. An accessory use may include accessory buildings and structures. Amenity centers and clubhouses are accessory uses to single family detached development, and may be located on separate platted lots. No accessory use shall be construed as allowing articles or material to be in the open or on the outside of the building.
- b. Site Plan means the Site Plan attached as **Exhibit C**, as amended in accordance with Section 3.
- c. Event center means a facility that may include some or all of the following types of uses: event space for weddings, meetings, parties, and other types of events; meeting rooms; game courts; fitness center/gym; swimming pools; athletic fields and facilities; childcare, dining; catering kitchen; spa facilities and services; and other similar uses.
- d. Property means the property depicted and described on Exhibit A.
- e. Public parking means parking available to the public that may be used to satisfy the parking requirement for a use located within or outside of the boundaries of this planned development district. Public parking may also provide excess parking that is not required by the Zoning Ordinance.
- f. Townhome means a single family dwelling unit horizontally attached to another dwelling unit by a common wall. Townhomes may be located on the same platted lot or on separate platted lots. The term townhome does not include a dwelling unit located above another dwelling unit. Townhomes are not included in the definition of a multi-family dwelling.
- g. Zoning Ordinance means the comprehensive zoning ordinance of the City of Willow Park attached as **Exhibit D**.
- 2. Applicable Regulations. Development and use of the Property shall comply with the Zoning Ordinance, as amended by Ordinance No. ____ establishing these planned development district zoning regulations. In the event of a conflict between the Zoning Ordinance or any other City ordinance, rule, or regulation and these planned development district zoning regulations, these planned development district zoning regulations shall control. With the exception of the Zoning Ordinance and these planned development district zoning regulations, no other zoning regulations shall apply to the development or use of the Property.
- 3. Site Plan; Future Approvals.

- a. Development and use of the Property shall comply with the Site Plan.
- b. The Site Plan may be amended from time to time provided each planning area shown on the Site Plan maintains roadway contiguity as shown on the original Site Plan attached as **Exhibit C**. City approval of a plat confirms the Site Plan amendment. Once the city approves the plat, the Site Plan attached as **Exhibit C** is automatically amended consistent with the approved plat.
- c. Any revision to the Site Plan that does not meet the requirements of Section 3(b) shall constitute a zoning amendment that requires compliance with the procedures for a change in zoning.
- d. When the Site Plan is amended pursuant to Section 3(b), the developer shall file a copy of the updated Site Plan that includes the date of the amendment with the Community Development Department and the City Secretary, and a copy of the amended plan shall be included in the City's official files for this planned development district.
- e. With the exception of amended Site Plans, which shall be governed exclusively by Sections 3(b)-(d), there shall be no requirements for approval of site plans, concept plans, or development plans referenced in the Zoning Ordinance. The Building Official shall issue a building permit if the permit application demonstrates compliance with these planned development district zoning regulations.
- 4. <u>Base Zoning Districts</u>. Each planning area shown on the Site Plan shall have a base zoning district as follows:
 - a. The base zoning district for the single family (SF) planning area shall be "R-5" Single-Family High Density District.
 - b. The base zoning district for the commercial (C) planning area shall be "C" Commercial District.
 - c. The base zoning district for the event center (EC) planning area shall be "C" Commercial District.
 - d. The base zoning district for the public parking (P) planning area shall be "C" Commercial District.
 - e. The base zoning district for the multi-family (MF) planning area shall be the "R-3" Multifamily District.
 - f. The base zoning district for the townhome (TH) planning area shall be "R-5" Single Family High Density District.
 - g. The base zoning district for the treatment plant (TP) planning area shall be "C" Commercial District, until ownership is transferred to the City.

h. The base zoning district for the greenbelt (GB) planning area shall be "FP" Flood Plain District.

5. Permitted Uses.

- a. In the single family (SF) planning area, the following uses are permitted by right: single family detached homes and accessory uses.
- b. In the commercial (C) planning area, the following uses are permitted by right:
 - · Accessory uses.
 - Amphitheater
 - Antique shops
 - · Assisted living or skilled nursing facility
 - Athletic facility, which may include athletic fields for football, soccer, baseball, and other sports
 - Bakeries
 - Banks, financial institutions
 - Barber and beauty shops
 - · Bicycle sales and service
 - Book and stationery stores, newsstands
 - Business college and private school facilities
 - · Caterer or wedding service
 - Cigar or tobacco stores
 - Cleaning, pressing and laundry collection
 - Confectioner stores
 - Copy center
 - Custom dressmaking or millinery shops
 - Day care nursery or pre-school
 - Drug stores, health product stores
 - Dry good, variety, notion stores
 - Event center
 - Express offices
 - · Fitness center, gym
 - Florist, jewelry, and gift shops
 - · Grocery stores, vegetable and meat markets
 - Hardware store
 - · Health and medical products for personal use
 - Horse stables
 - · Hotel and/ or motel
 - Household and office furniture
 - Imaging or x-ray center
 - Laboratory test facilities
 - · Lodge & Civic clubs
 - Medical provider offices (doctor, dentist, vision, chiropractic, and other)

- Medical supplies
- Movie Theater
- Musical instrument sales and supplies
- Optometry facility
- · Personal services
- Pet shop and related sales
- Photograph, portrait, camera shops and photo-finishing
- Physical therapy facility
- Professional offices (engineering, accounting, attorney, insurance, and other)
- Public parking
- · Radio and television sales and servicing
- Real estate offices
- Restaurants, cafes, cafeterias, delicatessen (with or without drive-thru windows or drive-ins)
- Retail stores (no limitation on type or size)
- Services, personal (salons, spas, licensed massage providers, and similar service uses)
- Service stations (no repair work)
- · Shoe repair
- Small animal hospital with no outside kennels
- Tailor, clothing or apparel shops
- Temporary concrete or asphalt batch plant during construction on the Property
- Temporary construction offices and trailers
- Temporary sales or leasing offices
- Theater
- c. In the event center (EC) planning area, the following uses are permitted by right: an event center, public parking, and accessory uses.
- d. In the public parking (P) planning area, the following use is permitted by right: public parking, food trucks, and outdoor dining areas.
- e. In the multi-family (MF) planning area, the following uses are permitted by right: multi-family, single family detached homes and accessory uses. A maximum of 208 multi-family dwelling units are permitted in the multi-family (MF) planning area.
- f. In the townhome (TH) planning area, the following uses are permitted by right: townhomes, single family detached homes, and accessory uses. A maximum of 110 townhomes are permitted in the townhome (TH) planning area.
- g. In the treatment plant (TP) planning area, the following uses are permitted by right: a public wastewater treatment plant, public parking, food trucks and outdoor dining areas, and accessory uses.

- h. In the greenbelt (GB) planning area, the following uses are permitted by right: open space (passive or active), including horseback riding, hike and bike trails, parks, accessory uses, public parking, and food trucks and outdoor dining areas.
- 6. <u>Development Standards</u>. Development of the Property shall be subject to the development standards for the applicable base zoning district, as set forth in the Zoning Ordinance, except as follows:
 - a. Single family detached homes may be developed pursuant to the following standards that shall be the exclusive lot size, density, setback, building height, lot coverage, and living area requirements for a single family detached home:
 - i. Minimum lot size: 5,000 square feet
 - ii. Minimum front yard setback: 15 feet. A corner lot shall be deemed have one front yard, which shall be the yard with the least street frontage.
 - iii. Minimum side yard setback: 5
 - iv. Minimum rear yard setback: 20
 - v. Maximum lot coverage: 45 percent (includes the footprint of all enclosed buildings on a lot)
 - vi. Maximum building height: 35 feet and two stories
 - vii. Maximum number of single family detached homes within the Property: 97
 - viii. Minimum gross living area per dwelling unit: 2,200 square feet
 - ix. Two car front entry garages are permitted.
 - b. Townhomes may be developed pursuant to the following standards that shall be the exclusive lot size, setback, building height, density, lot coverage, living area, and exterior construction and design requirements for a townhome:
 - i. Minimum lot size: 1,600 square feet
 - ii. Minimum front yard setback: 10 feet. A corner lot shall be deemed have one front yard, which shall be the yard with the least street frontage.
 - iii. Minimum side yard setback: none, except a minimum five foot side setback is required on a corner side yard that abuts a street
 - iv. Minimum rear yard setback: none
 - v. Minimum setback from the boundary of the townhome (TH) planning area: 20 feet

- vi. Maximum lot coverage: none
- vii. Maximum building height: 35 feet and two stories unless sprinklers installed throughout the structure then 50 feet and three stories
- viii. Maximum density: ten dwelling units per gross acre
- ix. Minimum gross living area per dwelling unit: 1,200 square feet
- x. Exterior construction and design regulations: Minimum standard masonry construction: 85% of exterior cladding of the structure. Masonry construction shall include all construction of a minimum of two different coordinated stone and/or brick materials, defined as follows: (a) Stone material. Masonry construction using stone material may consist of granite, marble, limestone, slate, river rock or other hard and durable naturally occurring all-weather stone. Cut stone and dimensioned stone techniques are acceptable.(b) Brick material. Brick material used for masonry construction shall be hard fired (kiln fired) clay or slate material which meets the latest version of ASTM standard C216, Standard Specifications for Face Brick (Solid Masonry Unit Made of Clay or Shale) and be Severe Weather (SW) grade and type FBA or FBS or better. Unfired or underfired clay, sand or shale brick are not allowed.
- c. Single family detached homes shall have a minimum roof pitch of 3:12.
- d. Single family detached homes shall be subject to the following:
 - i. The front elevation of each residence shall be 75 percent masonry, exclusive of doors, windows, dormers, and other architectural elements. Each side and rear elevations of a residence shall be at least 50 percent masonry, exclusive of doors, windows, dormers, and other architectural elements, except that a side elevation abutting a side street shall be at least 75 percent masonry, exclusive of doors, windows, dormers, and other architectural elements. For purposes of this paragraph, masonry means stucco, EIFS, brick, and stone.
- e. Single family detached homes with the same floor plan and architectural front elevation must have at least three lots of separation between them on the same side of the street and must not be directly across the street from each other.
- f. Front and rear yard setbacks in the commercial (C) planning area and the event center (EC) planning area shall be a minimum of 20 feet.
- g. The front yard setback shall apply based on the zoning of the lot, regardless of whether property along a block face is split by two or more zoning districts that require different front yard setbacks.
- h. Building lines shall not be required on plats.

- 7. <u>Development Matrix</u>. With each plat approval and building permit issuance, the developer shall submit an updated matrix that tracks the total number of single family detached homes, townhomes, and multi-family dwelling units to establish ongoing compliance with the requirements of these planned development district zoning regulations.
- 8. Overlay Districts. No overlay zoning district regulations shall apply to the Property, including, but not limited to, the I-20 overlay district regulations.
- 9. <u>Landscaping</u>. The City Manager may approve an alternative landscape plan for a platted lot provided the alternative plan meets or exceeds the total amount of landscaping required by the Zoning Ordinance for that lot.
- 10. <u>Signs</u>. The City Manager may approve an alternative sign plan for a platted lot provided the alternative plan meets the spirit and intent of the City's sign ordinance.
- 11. Fencing. Perimeter fencing is not required.
- 12. <u>Parking</u>. Required parking spaces may be located at any location within the Property, including within the floodplain. Required parking spaces are not required to be located on the same platted lot as the use that the parking serves but must be adjacent to or accessible from the use that the parking serves. Each townhome shall include a minimum of two parking spaces in an attached garage. For multi-family uses, a minimum of ten percent of the dwelling units shall have a garage, which shall count towards any covered parking requirements.
- 13. <u>Sidewalks</u>. Public sidewalks shall be constructed adjacent to all public roadways within the Property at the time a builder constructs a building on the adjacent private lot. In residential areas, sidewalks are required on only one side of the street. Sidewalks shall be located within the public right-of-way and maintained by the City. Sidewalks shall be a minimum of five feet in width with 4-inch thick concrete and otherwise constructed in accordance with the City's standard specifications.


14. Hike and Bike Trail; Open Space.

a. A hike and bike trail that is a minimum of three feet in width and a maximum of 11 feet in width shall be constructed within the greenbelt (GB) planning area shown on the Site Plan. The trail shall be constructed of crushed granite, hot mix asphaltic, concrete, or other material approved by the City. Construction of the trail shall be phased with the development, and shown on each final plat. At the developer's written request and after a final plat for at least 80 percent of the Property has been recorded, the developer will dedicate by separate instrument some or all of the greenbelt (GB) planning area shown on the Site Plan, including the hike and bike trail and public parking areas, and City will accept and maintain the dedicated area and improvements. The dedicated area may, at the developer's option, include lakes.

- b. With the exception of the areas referenced in Section 14(a) that will be dedicated to the City, all other open space designed on a recorded final plat shall be privately owned and maintained by a property owners association.
- c. There are no park land dedication, park fee, or open space requirements applicable to this Property.
- 15. <u>Storm Water</u>, Storm water from the Property shall be discharged directly into the Clear Fork of the Trinity River. Storm water detention and retention are not required for the development of the Property so long as the Property is in compliance with all applicable storm water regulations.

16. Streets.

- a. Private street improvements will be designed to standards approved by an engineer licensed by the State of Texas.
- b. All street and driveway connections to the I-20 service road are exclusively within the jurisdiction of the Texas Department of Transportation, and TxDOT shall be responsible for all permitting and regulatory control over such connections.

ORDINANCE N0.792-19

AN ORDINANCE CHANGING THE NAME OF CROWN LANE TO MARY LOU DRIVE; SAID STREET LOCATED IN THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS. PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, The City of Willow Park is a Type A General Law municipality located in Parker County, Texas, created in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 211 of the Local Government Code and operating pursuant to the enabling legislation of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the property owners adjacent to this street have requested the City of Willow Park change the name of this street located in the City of Willow Park;

WHEREAS, the City concurs with the request to change the street name to Mary Lou Drive as shown in EXHIBIT "A".

SECTION 1. AUTHORITY

The Mayor, or his designee, is hereby authorized and directed to implement the applicable provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. STREET NAME

The street right-of-way shown in EXHIBIT "A", attached hereto, that lies within the corporate city limits of the City is hereby named Mary Lou Drive.

SECTION 3. RECORDING

The City Secretary of the City of Willow Park is instructed to file a copy of this Ordinance reflecting the street name change authorized by this Ordinance with the Real property Records of the City of Willow Park and the Parker County Address Authority.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY

If for any reason any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, it shall not affect any valid provisions of this or any other Ordinance of the City of Willow Park to which these rules and regulations relate.



TEXAS SENATE BILL 42

SECTION 3 Subchapter A, Chapter 29, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 29.014 to read as follows:

Sec.29.014 COURT SECURITY COMMITTEE. (a) The presiding or municipal judge, as applicable, shall establish a court security committee composed of: (1) the presiding or municipal judge, or the judge's designee;

- (2) a representative of the law enforcement agency or other entity that provides the primary security for the court;
- (3) a representative of the municipality; and
- (4) any other person the committee determines necessary to assist the committee.
- (b) The person described by Subsection (a)(1) serves as presiding officer of the committee.
- (c) The committee shall establish the policies and procedures necessary to provide adequate security to the municipal courts served by the presiding or municipal judge, as applicable.
- (d)A committee may recommend to the municipality the uses of resources and expenditures of money for courthouse security, but may not direct the assignment of those resources or the expenditure of those funds.

TEXAS SENATE BILL 42

JUDGE JULIE KOCUREK JUDICIAL AND COURTHOUSE SECURITY ACT OF 2017

AN ACT relating to the security of courts and judges in the state; establishing a fee.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

- **SECTION 1.** This Act may be cited as the Judge Julie Kocurek Judicial and Courthouse Security Act of 2017.
- **SECTION 2.** Article 102.017(f), Code of Criminal Procedure, is amended to read as follows:
- (f) The sheriff, constable, or other law enforcement agency or entity that provides security for a court shall provide to the Office of Court Administration of the Texas Judicial System a written report regarding any security incident involving court security that occurs in or around a building housing a court for which the sheriff, constable, agency, or entity provides security not later than the third business day after the date the incident occurred. A copy of the report must be provided to the presiding judge of the court in which the incident occurred. The report is confidential and exempt from disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code.
- **SECTION 3.** Subchapter A, Chapter 29, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 29.014 to read as follows:
- Sec. 29.014. COURT SECURITY COMMITTEE. (a) The presiding or municipal judge, as applicable, shall establish a court security committee composed of:
- (1) the presiding or municipal judge, or the judge's designee;
- (2) a representative of the law enforcement agency or other entity that provides the primary security for the court;
- (3) a representative of the municipality; and
- (4) any other person the committee determines necessary to assist the committee.
- (b) The person described by Subsection (a)(1) serves as presiding officer of the committee.
- (c) The committee shall establish the policies and procedures necessary to provide adequate security to the municipal courts served by the presiding or municipal judge, as applicable.
- (d) A committee may recommend to the municipality the uses of resources and expenditures of money for courthouse security, but may not direct the assignment of those resources or the expenditure of those funds.

- **SECTION 4.** Section 30.00007, Government Code, is amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:
- (b) The presiding judge shall:
- (1) maintain a central docket for cases filed within the territorial limits of the municipality over which the municipal courts of record have jurisdiction;
- (2) provide for the distribution of cases from the central docket to the individual municipal judges to equalize the distribution of business in the courts;
- (3) request the jurors needed for cases that are set for trial by jury;
- (4) temporarily assign judges or substitute judges to exchange benches and to act for each other in a proceeding pending in a court if necessary for the expeditious disposition of business in the courts;
- (5) supervise and control the operation and clerical functions of the administrative department of each court, including the court's personnel, during the proceedings of the court; and
- (6) establish a court security committee to adopt security policies and procedures for the courts served by the presiding judge that is composed of:
- (A) the presiding judge, or the presiding judge's designee, who serves as presiding officer of the committee;
- (B) a representative of the law enforcement agency or other entity that provides the primary security for the court;
- (C) a representative of the municipality; and
- (D) any other person the committee determines necessary to assist the committee.
- (c) A court security committee may recommend to the governing body the uses of resources and expenditures of money for courthouse security, but may not direct the assignment of those resources or the expenditure of those funds.
- **SECTION 5.** Chapter 51, Government Code, is amended by adding Subchapter N to read as follows:

SUBCHAPTER N. ADDITIONAL FILING FEE FOR JUDICIAL AND COURT PERSONNEL TRAINING

Sec. 51.971. JUDICIAL AND COURT PERSONNEL TRAINING FEE.

(a) In addition to other fees authorized or required by law, the clerk of a district court, county court, statutory county court, statutory probate court, or justice court shall collect a \$5 fee on the filing of any civil action or proceeding requiring a filing fee, including an appeal, and on the filing of any counterclaim,

cross-action, intervention, interpleader, or third party action requiring a filing fee to be used as provided under Section 56.003.

- (b) A court may waive payment of a fee due under this section for an individual the court determines is indigent.
- (c) Fees due under this section shall be collected in the same manner as other fees, fines, or costs in the case.
- (d) The clerk of a district court, county court, statutory county court, statutory probate court, or justice court shall deposit the court costs and fees collected under this section in the appropriate local treasury and remit the court costs and fees to the comptroller in the manner provided under Subchapter B, Chapter 133, Local Government Code.
- (e) The comptroller shall deposit the fees received under this section to the credit of the judicial and court personnel training fund established under Section 56.001.
- (f) The comptroller may audit the records of a county related to costs and fees collected under this section.
- (g) Money spent from costs and fees collected under this section is subject to audit by the state auditor.
- **SECTION 6.** Section 56.003, Government Code, is amended by adding Subsection (h) to read as follows:
- (h) The court of criminal appeals shall grant legal funds to statewide professional associations and other entities that provide training to individuals responsible for providing court security.
- **SECTION 7.** Section 56.004(b), Government Code, is amended to read as follows:
- (b) The legislature shall appropriate funds from the judicial and court personnel training fund to the court of criminal appeals to provide for:
- (1) continuing legal education, technical assistance, and other support programs for prosecuting attorneys and their personnel, criminal defense attorneys who regularly represent indigent defendants in criminal matters and their personnel, and justices of the peace and their court personnel; (2) innocence training programs for law enforcement officers, law students, and other participants; and
- (3) court security training programs for individuals responsible for providing court security.
- **SECTION 8.** Subchapter B, Chapter 72, Government Code, is amended by adding Sections 72.015 and 72.016 to read as follows:

- Sec. 72.015. JUDICIAL SECURITY DIVISION. (a) The office shall establish a judicial security division to provide guidance to state court personnel on improving security for each court.
- (b) The office shall appoint a director of security and emergency preparedness to oversee the judicial security division.
- (c) The judicial security division shall:
- (1) serve as a central resource for information on local and national best practices for court security and the safety of court personnel;
- (2) provide an expert opinion on the technical aspects of court security; and
- (3) keep abreast of and provide training on recent court security improvements.

Sec. 72.016. NOTIFICATION PROCEDURE FOR JUDICIAL PRIVACY. The director shall develop a procedure to regularly notify county registrars, the Department of Public Safety, the Texas Ethics Commission, and any other state agency the office determines should be notified of the judges, judges' spouses, and related family members whose personal information must be kept from public records, as provided under Sections 552.117 and 572.035 of this code, Sections 13.0021 and 15.0215, Election Code, and Section 521.121, Transportation Code.

SECTION 9. Section 74.092, Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 74.092. DUTIES OF LOCAL ADMINISTRATIVE JUDGE. (a) A local administrative judge, for the courts for which the judge serves as local administrative judge, shall:

- (1) implement and execute the local rules of administration, including the assignment, docketing, transfer, and hearing of cases;
- (2) appoint any special or standing committees necessary or desirable for court management and administration;
- (3) promulgate local rules of administration if the other judges do not act by a majority vote;
- (4) recommend to the regional presiding judge any needs for assignment from outside the county to dispose of court caseloads;
- (5) supervise the expeditious movement of court caseloads, subject to local, regional, and state rules of administration;
- (6) provide the supreme court and the office of court administration requested statistical and management information;
- (7) set the hours and places for holding court in the county;
- (8) supervise the employment and performance of nonjudicial personnel;

- (9) supervise the budget and fiscal matters of the local courts, subject to local rules of administration;
- (10) coordinate and cooperate with any other local administrative judge in the district in the assignment of cases in the courts 'concurrent jurisdiction for the efficient operation of the court system and the effective administration of justice;
- (11) if requested by the courts the judge serves, establish and maintain the lists required by Section 37.003 and ensure appointments are made from the lists in accordance with Section 37.004;
- (12) perform other duties as may be directed by the chief justice or a regional presiding judge; and
- (13) establish a court security committee to adopt security policies and procedures for the courts served by the local administrative district judge that is composed of:
- (A) the local administrative district judge, or the judge's designee, who serves as presiding officer of the committee;
- (B) a representative of the sheriff's office;
- (C) a representative of the county commissioners court;
- (D) one judge of each type of court in the county other than a municipal court or a municipal court of record;
- (E) a representative of any county attorney's office, district attorney's office, or criminal district attorney's office that serves in the applicable courts; and
- (F) any other person the committee determines necessary to assist the committee.
- (b) A court security committee may recommend to the county commissioners court the uses of resources and expenditures of money for courthouse security, but may not direct the assignment of those resources or the expenditure of those funds.
- **SECTION 10.** Subchapter D, Chapter 101, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 101.06111 to read as follows:
- Sec. 101.06111. ADDITIONAL DISTRICT COURT FEES: GOVERNMENT CODE. The clerk of a district court shall collect an additional filing fee of \$5 under Section 51.971 in civil cases to fund judicial and court personnel training.
- SECTION 11. Subchapter E, Chapter 101, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 101.08111 to read as follows:
- Sec. 101.08111. ADDITIONAL STATUTORY COUNTY COURT FEES: GOVERNMENT CODE. The clerk of a statutory county court shall collect an additional filing fee of \$5 under Section 51.971 in civil cases to fund judicial and court personnel training.

- **SECTION 12.** Subchapter F, Chapter 101, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 101.10111 to read as follows:
- Sec. 101.10111. ADDITIONAL STATUTORY PROBATE COURT FEES: GOVERNMENT CODE. The clerk of a statutory probate court shall collect an additional filing fee of \$5 under Section 51.971 in civil cases to fund judicial and court personnel training.
- **SECTION 13.** Subchapter G, Chapter 101, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 101.12121 to read as follows:
- Sec. 101.12121. ADDITIONAL COUNTY COURT FEES: GOVERNMENT CODE. The clerk of a county court shall collect an additional filing fee of \$5 under Section 51.971 in civil cases to fund judicial and court personnel training.
- **SECTION 14.** Subchapter H, Chapter 101, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 101.1411 to read as follows:
- Sec. 101.1411. ADDITIONAL JUSTICE COURT FEES: GOVERNMENT CODE. The clerk of a justice court shall collect an additional filing fee of \$5 under Section 51.971 in civil cases to fund judicial and court personnel training.
- **SECTION 15.** Subtitle L, Title 2, Government Code, is amended by adding Chapter 158 to read as follows:

CHAPTER 158. COURT SECURITY OFFICERS

- Sec. 158.001. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "court security officer" means a constable, sheriff, sheriff's deputy, municipal peace officer, or any other person assigned to provide security for an appellate, district, statutory county, county, municipal, or justice court in this state.
- Sec. 158.002. COURT SECURITY CERTIFICATION. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b), a person may not serve as a court security officer for an appellate, district, statutory county, county, municipal, or justice court in this state unless the person holds a court security certification issued by a training program approved by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement.
- (b) A court security officer is not required to hold a court security certification to provide security to a court described by Subsection (a) before the first anniversary of the date the officer begins providing security for the court.

- **Sec. 158.003.** VERIFICATION. The sheriff, constable, law enforcement agency, or other entity that provides security for a court shall verify that each court security officer holds the court security certification as required by this chapter.
- **SECTION 16.** Subchapter D, Chapter 411, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 411.0485 to read as follows:
- **Sec.** 411.0485. PROTECTION FOR JUDGES. Any commissioned peace officer in this state, including a commissioned officer of the department, may provide personal security to a state judge at any location in this state, regardless of the location of the law enforcement agency or department that employs or commissions the peace officer.
- **SECTION 17.** Section 552.117(a), Government Code, is amended to read as follows:
- (a) Information is excepted from the requirements of Section 552.021 if it is information that relates to the home address, home telephone number, emergency contact information, or social security number of the following person or that reveals whether the person has family members:
- (1) a current or former official or employee of a governmental body, except as otherwise provided by Section 552.024;
- (2) a peace officer as defined by Article 2.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, or a security officer commissioned under Section 51.212, Education Code, regardless of whether the officer complies with Section 552.024 or 552.1175, as applicable;
- (3) a current or former employee of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice or of the predecessor in function of the department or any division of the department, regardless of whether the current or former employee complies with Section 552.1175;
- (4) a peace officer as defined by Article 2.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, or other law, a reserve law enforcement officer, a commissioned deputy game warden, or a corrections officer in a municipal, county, or state penal institution in this state who was killed in the line of duty, regardless of whether the deceased complied with Section 552.024 or 552.1175;
- (5) a commissioned security officer as defined by Section 1702.002, Occupations Code, regardless of whether the officer complies with Section 552.024 or 552.1175, as applicable;
- (6) an officer or employee of a community supervision and corrections department established under Chapter 76 who performs a duty described by Section 76.004(b), regardless of whether the officer or employee complies with Section 552.024 or 552.1175;

- (7) a current or former employee of the office of the attorney general who is or was assigned to a division of that office the duties of which involve law enforcement, regardless of whether the current or former employee complies with Section 552.024 or 552.1175;
- (8) a current or former employee of the Texas Juvenile Justice Department or of the predecessors in function of the department, regardless of whether the current or former employee complies with Section 552.024 or 552.1175;
- (9) a current or former juvenile probation or supervision officer certified by the Texas Juvenile Justice Department, or the predecessors in function of the department, under Title 12, Human Resources Code, regardless of whether the current or former officer complies with Section 552.024 or 552.1175;
- (10) a current or former employee of a juvenile justice program or facility, as those terms are defined by Section 261.405, Family Code, regardless of whether the current or former employee complies with Section 552.024 or 552.1175;
- (11) a current or former member of the Texas military forces, as that term is defined by Section 437.001;
- (12) a current or former federal judge or state judge, as those terms are defined by Section 13.0021(a), Election Code, or a spouse of a current or former federal judge or state judge; or
- (13) a current or former district attorney, criminal district attorney, or county attorney whose jurisdiction includes any criminal law or child protective services matter.
- **SECTION 18.** Section 572.002, Government Code, is amended by adding Subdivision (11-a) to read as follows: (11-a) "State judge" means:
- (A) a judge, former judge, or retired judge of an appellate court, a district court, a constitutional county court, a county court at law, or a statutory probate court of this state;
- (B) an associate judge appointed under Chapter 201, Family Code, or a retired associate judge or former associate judge appointed under that chapter;
- (C) a magistrate or associate judge appointed under Chapter 54 or 54A;
- (D) a justice of the peace; or (E) a municipal court judge.
- **SECTION 19.** Subchapter B, Chapter 572, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 572.035 to read as follows:
- Sec. 572.035. REMOVAL OF PERSONAL INFORMATION FOR FEDERAL JUDGES, STATE JUDGES, AND SPOUSES. On receiving notice from the Office of Court Administration of the Texas Judicial System of the judge's qualification for the judge's office, the commission shall remove

or redact from any financial statement, or information derived from a financial statement, that is available to the public the residence address of a federal judge, a state judge, or the spouse of a federal or state judge.

SECTION 20. Section 13.0021(a)(2), Election Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (2) "State judge" means:
- (A) a judge, former judge, or retired judge of an appellate court, a district court, a constitutional county court, a county court at law, or a statutory probate court of this state;
- (B) an associate judge appointed under Chapter 201, Family Code, or a retired associate judge or former associate judge appointed under that chapter;
- (C) a magistrate or associate judge appointed under Chapter 54 or 54A, Government Code;
- (D) a justice of the peace; or
- (E) a municipal court judge.

SECTION 21. Section 13.0021(b), Election Code, is amended to read as follows:

(b) If the registration applicant is a federal judge, a state judge, or the spouse of a state judge or a federal judge, the registrar of the county shall omit the applicant's residence address from the registration list.

SECTION 22. Section 15.0215, Election Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 15.0215. OMISSION OF ADDRESS FOR FEDERAL JUDGE OR STATE JUDGE AND SPOUSE. (a) In this section, "federal judge" and "state judge" have the meanings assigned by Section 13.0021.

- (b) On receiving notice from the Office of Court Administration of the Texas Judicial System of the person's qualification for office as a federal judge or state judge and of the name of the judge's spouse, if applicable, the registrar of the county in which the judge resides shall omit from the registration list the residence address of the judge and the spouse of the judge.
- (c) A registered district voter who wishes to verify that an elected judge whose personal identifying information is confidential under Section 552.1175, Government Code, resides in the district may request in writing that the registrar certify the judge lives in the district. The registrar shall exercise due diligence in determining the residence of the judge and respond to the voter in writing not later than the 10th business day after the date the request is received on whether the judge resides in the district. The registrar may not release the address of the

judge. The registrar is not required to certify the residence of the same judge more than once in a calendar year, but must provide copies of the certification to subsequent requestors.

SECTION 23. Section 133.058(d), Local Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (d) A county may not retain a service fee on the collection of a fee:
- (1) for the judicial fund;
- (2) under Article 42A.303 or 42A.653, Code of Criminal Procedure;
- (3) under Section 51.851, Government Code; or
- (4) under Section 51.971, Government Code.

SECTION 24. Subchapter F, Chapter 1701, Occupations Code, is amended by adding Section 1701.267 to read as follows:

Sec. 1701.267. TRAINING PROGRAM FOR COURT SECURITY OFFICERS. (a) The commission, in consultation with the Office of Court Administration of the Texas Judicial System, shall develop a model court security curriculum for court security officers, as required by Chapter 158, Government Code, and provide the curriculum to any training program the commission approves to provide training to court security officers.

(b) The commission shall issue a certificate to each court security officer who completes the training program under this section.

SECTION 25. Section 11.008, Property Code, is amended by adding Subsection (j) to read as follows:

(j) On receipt of a written request from a federal judge, state judge as defined by Section 572.002, Government Code, or spouse of a federal or state judge, the county clerk shall omit or redact from an instrument described by this section that is available in an online database made public by the county clerk, or by a provider with which the county commissioners court contracts to provide the online database, social security number, driver's license number, and residence address of the federal judge, state judge, or spouse of the federal or state judge.

SECTION 26. Section 25.025(b), Tax Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (b) Information in appraisal records under Section 25.02 is confidential and is available only for the official use of the appraisal district, this state, the comptroller, and taxing units and political subdivisions of this state if:
- (1) the information identifies the home address of a named individual to whom this section applies; and

- (2) the individual:
- (A) chooses to restrict public access to the information on the form prescribed for that purpose by the comptroller under Section 5.07; or
- (B) is a federal or state judge as defined by Section 572.002, Government Code, or the spouse of a federal or state judge, beginning on the date the Office of Court Administration of the Texas Judicial System notifies the appraisal district of the judge's qualification for the judge's office.
- **SECTION 27.** Section 521.121(c), Transportation Code, is amended to read as follows:
- (c) The department shall establish a procedure, on a license holder's qualification for office as a federal or state judge as defined by Section 572.002, Government Code, to omit the residence address of the judge and the spouse of the judge on the license holder's license and to include, in lieu of that address, the street address of the courthouse in which the license holder or license holder's spouse serves as a federal judge or state judge.
- SECTION 28. (a) Not later than January 1, 2018, the Office of Court Administration of the Texas Judicial System, the Department of Public Safety, the Texas Ethics Commission, each county clerk, each registrar, and any other county official responsible for county records shall establish the policies and procedures necessary to comply with the changes in law made by this Act.
- (b) As soon as practicable after the effective date of this Act:
- (1) the Office of Court Administration of the Texas Judicial System shall establish the judicial security division; and
- (2) each judge required to establish a court security committee under this Act shall establish the committee.
- **SECTION 29.** Section 51.607, Government Code, does not apply to the imposition of a fee assessed under Section 51.971(a), Government Code, as added by this Act.
- **SECTION 30.** A person serving as a court security officer as defined under Section 158.001, Government Code, as added by this Act, on the effective date of this Act is not required to receive the certification required under Section 158.002, Government Code, as added by this Act, before September 1, 2019.
- **SECTION 31.** This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.

Sentry Siren, Inc., has been building storm warning sirens since 1905. Currently, they manufacture 14 different models of storm warning sirens. As the regional representative for Sentry, my company has nearly 30 years of experience designing and installing Sentry storm warning systems. We have supplied and installed nearly 2000 sirens regionally and over 340 in the State of Texas.

Each Sentry siren is custom made using parts cast from the same metal ingot which means that the components expand and contract in the heat and cold at the same rate. This ensures significantly closer tolerances and longer operational life. When evaluated by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for use around power plants, Sentry sirens were estimated to have a 53 year life expectancy.

Unlike most competitive sirens, all Sentry sirens are covered by a complete 7 year warranty. Sentry is able to offer such a long warranty because they use superior components in the construction of each siren. For example, each Sentry siren uses a continuous-duty, series-wound motor rather than a permanent-magnet motor.

The benefit of a series-wound motor is two-fold: as the load on the motor increases, the magnetic field from the coils in the motor increases at the same time, allowing more torque to be generated; and the series-wound motor tends to be more energy efficient and lasts significantly longer than a permanent-magnet motor. ALL SENTRY SIRENS ARE PROUDLY MANUFACTURED IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

The Sentry model 14V-B is a large siren equipped with battery back-up. The 14V-B normally runs from 230 VAC, single-phase, 125 amp electrical service. However, in the event of a power failure, the siren will automatically switch to its bank of rechargeable batteries. Perhaps the key feature of the Sentry model 14V-B is the length of time the siren will run on batteries in a power failure. As is common in Texas, storms frequently come in lines over a 3 or 4 hour period. The quoted prices include installation of the Sentry model 14Vs or model 14V-Bs on 45" class II wooden telephone poles as well as all labor and materials associated with the complete installations. The only items the Village would have to provide would be the siren sites, appropriate electrical service to the siren poles and any information needed to program the radio decoders.

- 2. The 4 Remote Monitoring Units each consisting of a 5 watt transceiver, antenna, weatherproof enclosure, intrusion sensor, and audio sensor.

From the Central Station you would be able to:

- a. Activate all 3 sirens from one button.
- b. Activate individual sirens. When the sirens are activated, the system does not automatically poll the RMUs, but retains the information until poled or the system is activated again).
- c. Poll the entire system (requires approx.. 8 seconds)
- d. Poll individual sirens.
- e. When poled, the Central Station will display:
 - 1. Poll Failure, indicating that the signal was blocked or that the site has a problem such as no power.
 - 2. Sound or Sound Failure, indicated on the display by either a green or red light.
 - 3. Intrusion, reported immediately.
 - 4. Battery Status

The decision of when to activate the sirens is always a key questions. The **Storm Sentry Monitoring & Activation System** is designed to automatically activate the Village's sirens when a specific alert is issue by the National Weather Service. However, the Storm Sentry is capable of much more than simply activating the City's

GENERAL INFORMATION: CASA WX WEBSITE

Live Website: http://casaradar.com

The link is password protected and available only to CASA WX members. If your jurisdiction decides not to join the annual membership program, any logins from 2017 will be discontinued as of February 1, 2018.

The CASA WX site displays real time products from the CASA radar network. Currently seven radars are operational. The radars are turned on during weather events and turned off when the weather moves out of the radar network. This approach saves on the wear and tear of the radars. Occasionally the radars are turned on during clear weather to support important community events, as requested, to provide coverage in case of sudden storm initiation.




Figure 1 CASA WX website showing coverage from 7 radars

After logging into the website, the main page displays a networked view of all the radars. The white dots show the location of each radar, while the black rings show the range of each radar. The radars have overlapping coverage so that multi radar products can be created and there are multiple views of a weather feature from different radars. (Figure 1).

Navigation and Features




Figure 2 Radar view selection

On the top navigation bar, use the pull down menu to select a DFW network view or a single radar view (Addison, Arlington, Cleburne, Fort Worth, Mesquite, Midlothian, Denton). Single radar views can also be selected by clicking on the white dots at the radar location. (Figure 2).




Figure 3 DFW Network products




Figure 4 Single radar products

Once you choose the DFW network view or a single radar view, then different products can be selected. (Figures 3 and 4.)

(NEW) CASA Data Archive. You can now easily access archived CASA data directly from the CASA WX website. The archive starts April 1, 2016 and is current to the latest time. Data may be unavailable if the radar network or an individual radar was offline during the requested period.

Navigation: Click on the gray clock button next to the Product menu on the top left corner of the website. This will pull up 'start hour' and 'end hour' pull down menus (in the user's local time). The format is YYYY:MM:DD:HH. Select the start and end hour of interest and click the green arrow 'Download' button. The website will now display data starting at the start hour selected. Use the Play, Prev, Next buttons to move through the archived data set. Click on the circular arrow Refresh button in the bottom Navigation bar to return to current data. You can hide the start and end time pulldowns by clicking again on the gray clock button.




Figure 5 Midlothian radar showing the reflectivity product. Right clicking on the small cell west of Midlothian shows that the observation is at 865 ft.

Products. When you select a product, it displays the most recent data. Sometimes data will take a short time to load. Check the auto update box for automatic loading of most data, otherwise use the refresh button on the lower navigation bar. Each product page has a legend to help you interpret the data. You can zoom in and out of the data. For single radar data, right clicking on the data will tell you height above radar level (ARL) at which the data was collected. See Figure 5.




Figure 6 Lower navigation bar

The lower navigation bar has a series of buttons that can make the image clear or opaque, enable you to go back and forth in time, switch between CASA radar and NEXRAD radar, and display the date/time. The date/time displayed is called the valid time, the time for which the product was generated. For current observations, the valid date/time this should closely match the actual time. For forecast products, the valid date/time will be in the future. See Figure 6.

National Weather Service warnings are displayed graphically as polygons in real time as they occur.

Internet Browser Compatibility: The website works well with most computer-based and mobile device/ tablet based internet browsers other than Microsoft Internet Explorer. Google Maps has discontinued support of IE.

WEATHER PRODUCTS

CASA weather products are being rolled out in a phased approach. On a very basic level, radars work by sending out radio waves that bounce off of various "scatterers" such as raindrops, hail, debris, dust and insects, and then return a signal back to the radar. Weather products are produced by interpreting the signals gathered by the radar network based on our current knowledge about weather. Frequently radar data is ingested into computer models for this interpretation.





Figure 7 DFW Network Radar Reflectivity

1. Reflectivity + Winds. Reflectivity measures the intensity of rainfall and can give a general indication of where hail is falling; the shape of the reflectivity field can also show super cells, lines of thunderstorms, and whether a tornado is forming or present. CASA reflectivity products are produced every minute, and weather measurements are taken every 200 ft along the radar beam. Users can select both single radar views and whole network views of reflectivity. See Figure 7.

(NEW) Multiple Radar Tilts. Radars scan at multiple levels called tilts so they can observe the storm at different heights. The radar beam spreads like a flash light beam, the beam gets higher and higher as it get further way from the radar. You can now look at data from up to 3 tilts for individual radars. For most CASA users, looking at the 2 degree tilt will give you good information. If you want to know what is happening closest to ground level, then use the 1 degree tilt, where available.

Wind arrows show the direction of the wind. This product is great for keeping track of winds in real time as they impact your jurisdiction. This product updates each minute. Wind is measured at 5,000 ft and below. *Important*: If you don't see arrows, winds may still exist because 1) the radars can only measure wind where there is precipitation (rain, hail, sleet, snow) or other "scatterers" (dust, debris) and 2) this wind product requires overlapping radar coverage where the radar beams cross at certain angles and at certain heights. In addition, around the airport and skyscrapers some spurious winds may be reported by the radar. See Figure 8.



Toggle the Winds button and click the Clr button to make the

Reflectivity image transparent

Navigation: Toggle the winds button on the bottom to see the winds. This product is best seen at a zoomed in view. Each time you zoom in, toggle the wind button and you will see finer scale wind arrows. You can go back and forth in time, but each time you have to toggle the winds button to replot the winds.




Figure 9 Annotated screenshot of the website showing severe winds (~100+ mph) observed in Arlington on October 2, 2014, resulting in wide spread property damage as reported on Twitter

2. Radar Radial Velocity. Radial velocity measures wind speed and direction relative to where the radar beam is pointing. By knowing whether the wind is moving towards (shown in shades of green) or away (shown in shades of red) from the radar, radial velocity helps diagnose which parts of a storm system are rotating and whether that rotation could be a tornado. Velocity data can also show areas of damaging non-tornadic winds. CASA velocity data is fine-grained and from the

lowest parts of the atmosphere, so you can pinpoint where damaging winds or rotation is occurring in your community. Velocity data updates every minute, important for fast developing events. See Figure 9.

3. Rainfall Products. CASA rainfall products are the equivalent of having a rain gauge every ~800 feet in your jurisdiction. CASA's dual polarized radar beams can determine the shape and the size of precipitation as it falls to the ground. This information is very useful for determining how many inches of rain has fallen, and to determine where hail is falling.




Figure 10 The 12 hour accumulation product shows accumulation in inches over the last 12 hours

Rainfall products are created at the network level by combining measurements from CASA radars and the NEXRAD radar, and are accessed on the DFW Network pulldown menu. See Figure 10.

Rain Rate This product shows where it is raining hardest, with rain being measured in inches per hour. This product updates every minute.

Rainfall Accumulation These products indicate how many inches of rain have fallen in a given location over a fixed time period. Currently we are accumulating rain data over **15 minutes**, **30 minutes**, **1 hour**, **3 hours**, **6 hours**, **12 hours**, **24 hours** and **48 hours**. Rainfall measurements are accumulated over various time

periods to support different phases of flood response. 15 minutes, 20 minutes, 1 hour product updates every minute; the 3 hours, 6 hours, 12 hours, 24 hours and 48 hours accumulation products update every hour on the hour.

(NEW) Max 15min Accumulation. This product depicts the maximum rainfall accumulation over any 15 minute interval during the last hour. The product updates every minute. This product helps stormwater managers determine locations where flash flooding is most likely to occur.

Note that Accumulation products only measure the amount of rainfall that has fallen on the ground in a given location over a set time interval. It should not be interpreted as water depth level on the ground. Actual water depth or flooding depends on several other factors such as soil conditions, slope and drainage.

4. Hydrometeor Classification




Figure 11 Hydrometeor Type product showing regions with drizzle and rain in the network

The hydrometeor identification product can be used to detect hail. Data is updated each minute. Blue is snow; yellow is hail; orange is rain + hail; dark green is rain; light green is drizzle. See Figure 11. This product does not distinguish yet between large and small hail. Look for hail detection in the data that persists for several minutes. See Figure 11.

Navigation: Select the DFW Network view and then use the product menu to select Hydrometeor Type. You can loop this data, and make it transparent by using the clear button.

5. Hydrology Products

Through an NSF research grant and funding by the Fort Worth Public Works department, several hydrology products have been created that cover the cities of Fort Worth and Grand Prairie.

Run-Off Rate




Figure 12 1 hour runoff product showing very low (0.25 inches) of runoff over the past hour

When rain reaches the ground, it can either be absorbed by the soil or travel on top of soil or impervious surfaces (such as asphalt or concrete). As run off increases, risk of flooding can increase. The Run-off rate is measured in inches and is linked to the rainfall rate. Currently 1 hour runoff and 3 hour runoff products are being generated. See Figure 12.

Stream Flow




Figure 13 Stream flow information for Fort Worth, Arlington and Grand Prairie

The stream flow product shows the rate of water flowing in cubic feet per second. This advanced product should be used by storm water managers who understand what the normal flows are for the rivers and streams in the area. Runoff from rain eventually flows into streams which can increase stream flow, and eventually lead to flooding. See Figure 13.

Return period

Return period expresses the magnitude of streamflow into how often such a flow may occur at the location of interest. Hence, the larger the return period is, the larger the magnitude of potential flooding is. The National Weather Service generally assumes flash flooding when the flow level in small streams reaches or exceeds a 2-yr return period.

6. NOWCAST

What you are seeing: The NOWCAST projects the location of reflectivity 5, 10, and 15 minutes out in time. The scale is the same as standard reflectivity measurements. It can tell you when a storm cell or intense weather is projected to arrive at your area. The 5, 10, and 15 minute NOWCASTs are updated every minute.

Navigation: The site displays the 5-minute NOWCAST. Toggle once for 10 minute nowcast, again for the 15 minute nowcast. No playback is enabled.

7. Model Reflectivity + Winds




Figure 14 This product can show wind direction in clear weather.

This product provides situational awareness for wind direction for the North Texas region in both precipitation and clear air. Observations combine surface sensors, radars, and other sensors. *Important*: This product is updated every 5 minutes. The valid time is frequently 10 minutes behind the actual time. See Figure 14.

Navigation: Toggle the winds button on the bottom navigation bar to see the winds. Each time you zoom in and out, toggle the winds button off and on to adjust the density of the arrows.

8. Advanced Dual-Polarization Products. These products are appropriate for users with advanced radar interpretation skills. For the typical user, the most relevant product is the **Correlation Coefficient** which can be used along with reflectivity and velocity data to confirm tornado touch down. This product shows the debris sent into the air by a tornado that is on the ground. In addition, **Differential Reflectivity** provides information on the shape of the precipitation, and **Specific Differential Phase** helps to detect heavy rain.

CASA Alerts mobile application

The CASA Alerts app issues alert notifications to users during severe weather events based on alerting notifications set by the user. Users can view the severe weather threats relative to their locations of interest. Users can participate in surveys delivered through the app to assist in research on severe weather decision-making.

Requirements

- The app currently works only on iOS devices (iPhone and IPad).
- iOS 8.0 or higher required
- User must enable location tracking to receive the most relevant alerts

Download Instructions

- App can be downloaded only on one mobile device per user

Configuration

1. Setting locations of interest

Users can specify multiple locations for which they need severe weather notifications.

- Users can pick multiple locations of interest on the map by dropping pins and assigning a unique name for each location
- Users can drop multiple connected pins to define a bounded area (for e.g. airport boundaries) as a region of interest.

2. Setting hazard alerting preferences

Users can select various weather hazards for which they would like to receive alerts.

Hazard information is collected from various data sources. Currently these include:

- National Weather Service issued severe weather, tornado and flood warnings
- Local storm reports of strong winds, hail and tornadoes
- High resolution storm activity, rainfall and hail measurements derived using proprietary algorithms running on CASA radar network observations
- High wind and hail measurements made by local Understory™ sensors
- Short term forecasts (CASA proprietary "NOWCAST"s) of storm activity

For each hazard of interest, users can specify an alerting preference based either on distance from hazard or time to impact.

Using the App

1. Severe Weather Notifications

Based on weather hazards and user preferences for alerting, notifications are delivered in several formats.

- Real-time CASA images (past 30 minutes, current, short term forecasts) of radar reflectivity
- Real-time display of NWS issued warnings
- Color coded display showing various hazards along with representative icons
- Alerts on home screen, also available as a listing of all available alerts within the app itself

2. Surveys and Reporting

Researchers have the ability to send targeted surveys to users based on research study goals. Surveys can be sent on an ad-hoc basis or as a result of automatic triggers. Users can also send back reports (feature in development).




Figure: Screenshots of surveys and reports

CASA Radars Early Warning Benefits

CASA Radars provide precise, actionable information that helps emergency managers and other public safety personnel manage weather hazards in their jurisdictions more effectively and keep their communities safe. Early warning benefits can be summarized in four categories:

- 1. **Increased lead time** The CASA radar network provides a very detailed view of severe weather as it travels, generally west to east, through north central Texas. Public safety can track what is heading for them and make appropriate decisions.
- 2. **Decreased false alarms** The CASA radar network helps emergency managers know when NOT to warn their jurisdictions. Frequent false alarms lead to people not heeding warnings and not taking protective actions.
- 3. **Better understanding of the severity of the weather** The CASA radar network provides measurements of velocity, shows hail cores, and identifies potential tornados, enabling more targeted and confident warnings to the public.
- 4. **Street-level precision of data** –Emergency managers are able to focus on the areas of highest risk for hazardous weather due the street level accuracy of the data.

Four cases are presented as examples of Early Warning Benefits reported by National Weather Service forecasters, emergency management professionals and city officials.

CASE I. JANUARY 15, 2017 TORNADOES

A major storm system coming from the south resulted in two tornados in the greater metroplex, high winds, and floods. Emergency managers and National Weather Service Forecasters used CASA data to track a tornado-producing storm cell as it travelled through the most populous areas of north central Texas.

Early Warning Benefits of CASA for Dallas, Ellis and Tarrant county included:

• Increased lead time. NWS forecasters used CASA data to help provide a tornado warning with 10 minutes lead time for a tornado that touched down in Grand Prairie, Dallas County. Studies show that nationwide, each additional minute of tornado warning lead time can reduce the potential injuries of a tornado by 1.1%.

"At 831 PM CST, a severe thunderstorm capable of producing a tornado was located south of Grand Prairie moving north at 35 mph. <u>CASA radar</u> indicates that this possible tornado will cross I-20 in Grand Prairie in the next few minutes."

--Tornado Warning, National Weather Service Fort Worth TX

• Street-level precision of data. Using CASA data, NWS forecasters were able to provide precise tracking of tornado risk for emergency managers as the storm traveled north. This information allows local public safety official to make better decisions for their jurisdictions.


"At 748 PM CST, a severe thunderstorm capable of producing a tornado was located just north of Grandview. CASA radar indicates that the circulation has just crossed I-35 and will pass between FM-1807 and FM-2258 southeast of Alvarado." --Severe Weather Statement. National Weather Service Fort Worth TX

"At 802 PM CST, a severe thunderstorm capable of producing a tornado was located just north of highway 67 between Alvarado and Venus. CASA radar indicates that this circulation will approach Pleasant Point and Lillian over the next few minutes." --Tornado Warning, National Weather Service Fort Worth TX

• **Decreased False Alarms.** Using the CASA data, the city of Forth Worth was confident enough that the tornado was not going to impact the city and decided not to sound sirens. They avoided warning the east side of the city, with a population of approximately 200,000.

"On January 15, 2017 there was a storm coming up from the south. We watched this storm on CASA radars and saw that it looked like it was going to hit the far east side of the City. As we continued to monitor each minute we noticed the storm was going just to the east of the City of Fort Worth city limits thus eliminating the need for us to warn any Fort Worth citizens. Seeing a detailed path of the storm allowed us to

provide life safety notifications to citizens when necessary and helped to create less false alarms from our office." – Juan Ortiz, City of Fort Worth, Emergency Management Coordinator (Formerly)

CASE II. DECEMBER 26, 2015 OVILLA-GLENN HEIGHTS TORNADO

This EF-3 tornado with maximum winds of 145-155 mph was on the ground for 12 minutes and covered a distance of 8.5 miles.


CASA Early Warning Benefits for Ellis County included:

• **Increased lead time:** Public safety officials in Ellis County sounded sirens for this event based on CASA radars.

"With the CASA radar system in the Midlothian area, it gives a lot of advanced notice, and we were able to communicate that to the community. And I think that has really assisted in seeing a decrease in injuries."

--Ellis County Judge Carol Bush, press conference, following the tornado.

• Street-Level Precision: The damage path of the tornado matched up at an INTERSECTION-BY-INTERSECTION level with the high resolution CASA radar imagery. This type of granular resolution is unavailable on the NWS NEXRAD radars.




Radar data from Glenn Heights tornado as shown by CASA and the tornado damage path (grey circles) as determined by an NWS post event survey.

CASE III. MARCH 29, 2017 LINE OF THUNDERSTORMS

A Squall line impacted the metroplex in the early morning with significant high winds and several tornados.

CASA Early Warning Benefits included:

Street-Level Precision: CASA radars provide good view of the leading edge of squall lines, showing where tornados might spin up and areas of high winds.




Radar data showing the EF0 Keller tornado at the leading edge of line of storms. The circulation can be tracked precisely until the tornado lifts near Southlake.

CASE IV. HIGH WINDS AND TORNADO ON MARCH 8, 2016

A line of severe thunderstorms moved through the metro area in the early hours of the morning on March 8, 2016. As the line approached the City of Fort Worth, it had already exhibited signs of tornado risk and a Tornado Warning had already been issued on the storm by the NWS Forecast Office.

CASA early warning benefits for Tarrant County included:

- **Decreased false alarms**. NWS forecasters used CASA data to help determine that the northern part of the storm would not produce a tornado. Therefore they cancelled the tornado warning for the northern part of the storm. The CASA data did, however, provide more precise wind measurements and the NWS was able to warn the local public safety community about 60 70 mph winds.
- Better understanding of the severity of the weather and street level precision. In the southern part of the storm, NWS forecasters saw evidence of a tornado in the CASA data and therefore continued the tornado warning for that part of the storm. An EF0 tornado was later confirmed through an NWS damage survey that matched the CASA tornado signature with street level precision.


CASE V. MARCH 17, 2016 HAILSTORM

A damaging hail storm hit the DFW Metroplex, resulting in at least \$600 million in auto and property claims with at least 50,000 vehicles damaged. It is estimated to be the 12th costliest storms in Texas history. The University of North Texas Office of Risk Management Services was able to use CASA data to keep its facilities safe.

Early Warning Benefits for the University of North Texas at Denton included:

- Better understanding of the severity of the weather. CASA Radar uses dual polarization and advanced signal processing technology that enables the easy and precise identification of hail cores within a thunderstorm.
 - "On March 17th, 2016, the University of North Texas (UNT) Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was actively monitoring severe weather impacting the North Texas region. One particular storm cell was continuing to intensify as it moved west to east, tracking directly toward the university campus. As part of normal operations, the EOC utilizes multiple weather monitoring programs to track severe weather. On this particular day, the CASA radar was indicating a significant hail core. However, no other program utilized in the EOC was indicating the presence of hail." Brad Scott, Director of Risk Management Services, University of North Texas, Denton
- Increased lead time and street-level precision. Hail events can quickly develop, so knowing that a hail core is tracking towards their facility can enable safety officials quickly take evasive, protective or response actions.

"UNT was able to accurately track the hail core using the CASA radar as it moved towards campus. This allowed EOC personnel to communicate with Facilities and Maintenance personnel and direct them toward the parts of campus that were most likely impacted. 


CASA Radar showing precise location of hail core (orange) within the rain bands (green) as hail approaches University of North Texas (UNT) campus.










ORDINANCE NO. 793-19

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE 13.11 OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK'S CODE OF ORDINANCES, BY DELETING SECTION 13.11.035 IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPEALING AND REPLACING DIVISION 3. EMERGENCY WATER RATIONING PLAN WITH A REVISED DIVISION 3. DROUGHT CONTINGENCY AND EMERGENCY WATER PLAN; ADOPTING A REVISED DROUGHT CONTINGENCY/EMERGENCY WATER PLAN ATTACHED HERETO AS EXHIBIT "A"; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000.00; PROVIDING FOR VARIANCES; PROVIDING A CUMULATIVE REPEALER CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Willow Park (the "City") finds that conservation of water and protection of its water supply is in the best interest of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the City is required to submit updated water conservation and drought contingency and emergency water management plans to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and the Texas Water Development Board in accordance with Title 30 of the Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 288; and

WHEREAS, the City has entered into a wholesale water purchase agreement with the City of Fort Worth to purchase up to 3.4 MGD and that agreement requires that the City adopt a drought contingency and emergency water plan that is consistent with and follows the same water conservation restrictions as the City of Fort Worth; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends that the City Council adopt the amended drought contingency and emergency water management plan attached hereto as Exhibit "A" that is consistent with and follows the same water conservation restrictions as the City of Fort Worth and is in compliance with the requirements of Title 30 of the Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 288; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILLOW PARK, TEXAS:

SECTION I. INCORPORATION OF PREMISES

The above and foregoing premises to this Ordinance are true and correct and are incorporated herein and made a part hereof for all purposes.

SECTION II. ENACTMENT

- A. Section 13.11.035 of the City's Code of Ordinances is deleted in its entirety.
- B. The Drought Contingency and Emergency Water Management Plan attached hereto as Exhibit "A" is hereby adopted by the City in accordance with the requirements of the TCEQ and supersedes the City's prior drought contingency and water emergency management plan referenced in Section 13.11.035 of the City's Code of Ordinances.

B. Division 3. Emergency Water Rationing Plan as set forth in the City's Code of Ordinances is hereby repealed and replaced with a revised "Division 3. Drought Contingency and Emergency Water Management Plan" as follows:

"Division 3. Drought Contingency and Emergency Water Management Plan

Sec. 13.11.091 Emergency Authority

- (a) *Purpose and scope*. The purpose of this section is to establish the city's policy in the event of shortages or delivery limitations in the city's water supply and to establish water restrictions to be enforced in case of drought or emergency conditions. This section applies to:
 - (1) All persons and premises within the city using water from the water system;
- (2) All retail customers who live in unincorporated areas within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction and are served by the water system; and
- (b) Drought contingency/emergency water management plan. The revised drought contingency/emergency water management plan attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference, is hereby adopted by the city as the city's drought contingency/emergency water management plan.
- (c) *Authority*. The city manager is authorized to implement measures prescribed when required by this section and by the drought contingency/emergency water management plan approved by the city council.
- (d) *Initiation of plan stages*. The director of public works, upon determination that drought conditions or a water emergency exists as described in the drought contingency/emergency water management plan, shall advise the city manager. The city manager may order that the appropriate stage of the drought contingency/emergency water management plan be initiated. To be effective, the order must be:
 - (1) Made by public announcement to the news media;
 - (2) Published on the city's website; and
 - (3) Published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city.
- (e) Duration of stage; change. A stage will remain in effect until the conditions that triggered initiation of the stage have been eliminated. If the stage is initiated because of excessive demands, all initiated actions will remain in effect through September 30 of the year in which they were triggered unless the city manager determines that conditions exist that will allow termination of the stage before September 30. Upon recommendation of the director of public works, the city manager may terminate, upgrade or downgrade the stage. Any such change must be made in the same manner prescribed in subsection (d) above.
- (f) Violation of section. A person commits an offense if he or she knowingly makes, causes or permits a use of water contrary to the measures implemented by the city manager as prescribed in the drought contingency/emergency water management plan. For purposes of this subsection (f), it is presumed that a person has knowingly made, caused or permitted a use of water contrary to the measures implemented if the mandatory measures have been formally ordered consistent with the terms of subsection (d) above and:
- (1) The manner of use has been prohibited by the drought contingency/emergency water management plan;
- (2) The amount of water used exceeds that allowed by the drought contingency/emergency water management plan; or

- (3) The manner or amount used violates the terms and conditions of a compliance agreement made pursuant to a variance granted by the director of public works pursuant to subsection (h) below.
- (g) *Penalties for violation*. Any person who is convicted of violating, disobeying, omitting, neglecting or refusing to comply with a measure implemented in accordance with this section and the drought contingency/emergency water management plan may be fined not more than \$2,000.00 for each offense. In addition, the following penalties shall apply:
- (1) A person who is convicted of violating, disobeying, omitting, neglecting or refusing to comply with a measure implemented in accordance with this section and stage 2 of the drought contingency/emergency water management plan shall be fined not less than \$250.00;
- (2) A person who is convicted of violating, disobeying, omitting, neglecting or refusing to comply with a measure implemented in accordance with this section and stage 3 of the drought contingency/emergency water management plan shall be fined not less than \$500.00;
- (3) If a person is convicted of violating, disobeying, omitting, neglecting or refusing to comply with a measure implemented in accordance with this section and the drought contingency/emergency water management plan two times, the director may install a flow restrictor in the water line to the premises where the violations occurred to limit the amount of water that may pass through the meter in a 24-hour period or a lock-out device to a backflow assembly; and
- (4) If a person is convicted of violating, disobeying, omitting, neglecting or refusing to comply with a measure implemented in accordance with this section and the drought contingency/emergency water management plan three times, the director may discontinue water service to the premises where the violation occurred.
- (h) *Variances*. During the times the emergency order is operative, the director of public works may grant variances only under the following circumstances and conditions:
- (1) The applicant signs a compliance agreement on a form provided by the city, and approved by the city attorney, agreeing to use the water only in the amount and manner permitted by the variance;
- (2) Granting of the variance would not cause an immediate significant reduction in the city's water supply;
- (3) Failure to approve the variance would result in an extreme hardship or need relating to the health, safety or welfare of the applicant; and
 - (4) Granting the variance would not adversely affect the premises at which the violation occurred.
- (i) Revocation of variances. The director of public works may revoke a variance when he or she determines that:
 - (1) The conditions of subsection (h) above are not being met or are no longer applicable;
 - (2) The terms of the compliance agreement are being violated; or
 - (3) Revocation is advisable to protect the health, safety or welfare of other persons.
- (j) Appeal. Denial or revocation of a variance by the director of public works can be appealed to the city manager by filing a written notice of appeal with the city manager within ten days after issuance of the denial or revocation. The city manager's decision shall be final."

SECTION III. MISCELLANEOUS

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1. INTRODUCTION AND OBJECTIVES

The purpose of this Drought Contingency and Emergency Water Management Plan (subsequently referred to as the Plan) is as follows:

- To conserve the available water supply in times of drought and emergency
- To maintain supplies for domestic water use, sanitation, and fire protection
- To protect and preserve public health, welfare, and safety
- To minimize the adverse impacts of water supply shortages
- To minimize the adverse impacts of emergency water supply conditions.

2. TEXAS COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY RULES

TCEQ rule Title 30, Part 1, Chapter 288, Subchapter A, Rule 288.1 (4) defines a drought contingency plan as "a strategy or combination of strategies for temporary supply and demand management responses to temporary and potentially recurring water supply shortages and other water supply emergencies."

TCEQ rules governing development of and minimum requirements for drought contingency plans for municipal water suppliers and wholesale water suppliers are contained in Texas Administrative Code Title 30, Part 1, Chapter 288, Subchapter B, Rule 288.20 and Rule 288.22, respectively.

3. WATER SYSTEM PROFILE

As of March 2019, the City has a groundwater well system of 24 wells that produce water from both the Paluxy and Trinity aquifers. The capacity of the groundwater system is approximately 1.5 MGD. The City also has signed a joint agreement with Hudson Oaks to purchase water from the City of Fort Worth in an amount up to 3.4 MGD. It is expected that the infrastructure will be in place by 2022 to provide water from Fort Worth to both the Cities of Willow Park and Hudson Oaks. The City of Fort Worth purchases water from the Tarrant Regional Water District (TRWD).

The City of Willow Park also has a connection in place and is able to purchase up to 200,000 gpd of water from the City of Weatherford on an emergency basis.

As of March 2019, The City of Willow Park has approximately 105 commercial connections and 1700 residential connections and maintains approximately 60 miles of distribution pipelines. The City expects to add approximately 150 connections per year over the next 10 years.

In accordance with Section 2.5 of the wholesale water contract with Fort Worth, the City of Willow Park, as a wholesale customer, will be required to institute and apply the same rationing, conservation measures or restrictions to the use of water by their customers for so long as any part of their total water supply is being furnished by Fort Worth. Pursuant to Section 2.5 of the wholesale water contract with Fort Worth, this drought contingency plan is consistent with, and follows the terms of, the City of Fort Worth's current Drought Contingency and Emergency Water Management Plan adopted in May 2014.

4. DROUGHT CONTINGENCY/EMERGENCY WATER MANAGEMENT PLAN

4.1 Public Involvement

The public had several opportunities to provide input into the plan.

- A public meeting soliciting comments was held on March 5th, 2019. The meetings were advertised on the city Web site and published in the Community News.
- The draft plan was posted on the City of Willow Park's Web site (www.willowpark.org) for one month prior to City Council adoption.
- Copies were available to anyone upon request.

4.2 Public Education

The City will inform and educate the public about the Drought Contingency/Emergency Water Management Plan by the following means:

- Preparing fact sheets describing the plan and making these available online and at various city sites.
- Mailing out fact sheets to all water customers.
- Posting a copy of the Plan on the city's Web site.
- Notifying local organizations, schools, and civic groups that staff are available to make presentations on the plan.
- Various social media platforms, including email and text messaging as applicable.

At any time that the Drought Contingency/Emergency Water Management Plan is activated or the stage changes, the City will notify local media of the issues, the current response stage, and the specific actions required of the public. The information will also be publicized on the city's Web site. Bill inserts will also be used as appropriate.

4.3 Initiation & Termination of Drought & Emergency Response Stages

The provisions of this Plan shall apply to all persons, customers, and property utilizing potable water provided by the City of Willow Park. The terms "person" and "customer" as used in the Plan include individuals, corporations, partnerships, associations, and all other legal entities. The Plan does not apply to locations using treated wastewater effluent or private wells.

The Plan may be applied to the entire city or geographic portions of the city as necessary. If the Plan is applied only to a limited sector, the boundaries will be defined in terms of roadways, creeks and other easily distinguishable features, such as city limits.

Initiation of a Drought/ Emergency Water Management Stage

The City Manager or his/her official designee may order the implementation of a drought response or water emergency stage when one or more of the trigger conditions for that stage is met. The following actions will occur when a stage is initiated.

- The public will be notified through local media and the City of Willow Park Web site, as described in Section 4.2.
- The City of Willow Park Water Department will notify the Executive Director of the TCEQ within 5 business days when mandatory provisions of the Plan are activated.

Stages imposed by the City of Fort Worth's action must be initiated by the City of Willow Park (

For other trigger conditions, the City Manager or his/her official designee may decide not to order the implementation of a drought response or water emergency stage even though one or more of the trigger criteria for the stage are met. Factors which could influence such a decision include, but are not limited to, the time of the year, weather conditions, the anticipation of replenished water supplies, or the anticipation that additional facilities will become available to meet needs. The reason for this decision should be documented.

Termination of a Drought Stage

The City Manager or his/her official designee may order the termination of a drought response or water emergency stage when the conditions for termination are met or at their discretion. The following actions will be taken when a drought stage is terminated:

- The public will be notified through local media and the City of Willow Park Web site as described in Section 4.2.
- If any mandatory provisions of the drought contingency/emergency water management plan that have been activated are terminated, the City of Willow Park Water Department will notify the Executive Director of the TCEQ within 5 business days.

The City Manager or his/her official designee may decide not to order the termination of a drought response stage or water emergency even though the conditions for termination of the stage are met. The City Manager or his/her official designee may choose to implement a phased-out approach when exiting various stages to protect the integrity of the system. Factors which could influence such a decision include, but are not limited to, the time of the year, weather conditions, or the anticipation of potential changed conditions that warrant the continuation of the drought stage. The reason for this decision should be documented.

4.4 Drought and Emergency Response Stages

Stage 1 - Water Watch

Triggering Conditions

- City of Willow Park Water demand reaches or exceeds 90% of reliable delivery capacity over a 24-hour period. The delivery capacity could be citywide or in a specified portion of the system.
- City of Willow Park water treatment or distribution system becomes contaminated.
- City of Willow Park's water demand for all or part of the delivery system approaches delivery capacity because delivery capacity is inadequate.
- City of Willow Park's water supply system is unable to deliver water due to the failure or damage of major water system components.

• To initiate the updated Drought Contingency plan, on or around May 1, 2019, the City of Willow Park will begin in Stage 1 Drought Conditions and will terminate Stage 1 at the discretion of the City Manager or his/her designee.

Terminating Conditions for Stage 1

At the discretion of the City Manager or his/her official designee, Stage 1 will terminate when the conditions triggering Stage 1 have ceased to exist for a period of 3 consecutive days for any initiation due to Willow Park water supply or upon notification from Fort Worth that they are terminating Stage 1 for their wholesale customers.

Goal for Use Reduction for Stage 1

The goal for water use reduction under Stage 1, Water Watch, is five percent. If circumstances warrant or if required by the City of Fort Worth, the Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee can set a goal for greater water use reduction.

Actions Available for Stage 1

The Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee may order the implementation of any of the actions listed below, as deemed necessary. The Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee must follow the action(s) required by the City of Fort Worth.

All Water Users

Initiate mandatory restrictions to prohibit non-essential water use as follows:

- Discourage hosing of paved areas, such as sidewalks, driveways, parking lots, tennis courts, patios, or other impervious surfaces, except to alleviate an immediate health or safety hazard. This may include premises with raw or processed food, pharmaceutical or vaccine processing, storage or vending establishments including restaurants and grocery stores may be washed to the extent necessary for sanitary purposes. These areas mayalso include:
 - Trash and dumpster areas
 - Areas around fuel pumps
 - Store front cleaning of areas with accumulated bird droppings, feathers and debris
 - Localized spot cleaning of parking areas to remove oil, grease buildup that may pose ahealth and safety issue.
- Discourage hosing of buildings or other structures for purposes other than fire protection or surface preparation prior to painting.
- Prohibit using water in such a manner as to allow runoff or other waste, including:
 - failure to repair a controllable leak, including a broken sprinkler head, a leaking valve, leaking or broken pipes, or a leaking faucet;

- operating a permanently installed irrigation system with: (a) a broken head; (b) a head that is out of adjustment and the arc of the spray head is over a street or parking lot; or (c) a head that is misting because of high water pressure; or
- during irrigation, allowing water to (a) to run off a property and form a stream of water in a street for a distance of 50 feet or greater; or (b) to pond in a street or parking lot to a depth greater than one-quarter of an inch.
- Allowing or causing an irrigation system or other lawnwatering device to operate during any form of precipitation or when temperatures are at or below 32 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Prohibit outdoor watering with sprinklers or irrigation systems between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- Limit landscape watering with sprinklers or irrigation systems at each service address to a twice per week schedule as outlined below. This includes landscape watering of parks, golf courses, and sports fields.
 - Residential addresses ending in an even number (0, 2, 4, 6, or 8) may water on Wednesdays and Saturdays.
 - Residential addresses ending in an odd number (1, 3, 5, 7 or 9) may water on Thursdays and Sundays.
 - All non-residential locations (apartment complexes, businesses, industries, parks, medians, etc.) may water on Tuesdays and Fridays.
 - o No watering on Mondays. (Not in FW)

Exceptions:

- Watering on any day by handheld hose, drip irrigation, a soaker hose or tree bubbler. This exception is exclusively for trees, shrubs and foundations.
- Water use necessary for the repair of an irrigation system, plumbing line, fountain, etc. in the presence of the person making therepair.
- Outdoor watering at service addresses with large multi-station irrigation systems may take place in accordance with a variance granted by Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee, if the City Manager determines that a property cannot be completely irrigated with an average of three-quarters of an inch of water in a single day, and that the property should be divided into sections to be irrigated on different days. If approved, no station will be watered more than twice per week.
- If hydromulch, grass sod, or grass seed is installed for the purpose of establishing a new lawn, there are no watering restrictions for the first 30 days while it is being established. Residents and commercial users need to notify the City of Willow Park upon installation of new grass hydromulch, grass sod, or grass seed. After that, the watering restrictions set forth in this stage apply. (This does not include over

- seeding with rye, or seasonal grasses, since turf already exists.)
- If golf courses using City of Willow Park water for irrigation may water greens and tee boxes as necessary, however watering must be done before 10 a.m. and after 6p.m. Encouraged to reduce water use by five percent..
- Skinned areas of sports fields may be watered as needed for dust control.
- Watering of athletic fields (fields only, does not include surrounding landscaped areas) used for organized sports practice, competition, or exhibition events may occur as necessary to protect the health and safety of the players, staff, or officials present for athletic events. Encouraged to reduce water use by fivepercent.
- Public areas that are open to the public at-large and have a high –impact from frequent use may be allowed additional watering, with a variance granted by the Willow Park City Manager, if it is deemed to be beneficial to serve and protect the community amenity. Examples may include but are not limited to: outdoor amphitheaters, demonstration gardens, public art exhibitions, outdoor learning areas, arboretums, etc.
- All users are encouraged to use native and adapted drought tolerant plants in landscaping.
- Washing of any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane, or other vehicle shall be limited to the use of a hand-held bucket or a hand-held hose equipped with a positive-pressure shutoff nozzle for quick rinses. Vehicle washing may be done at any time on the premises of a commercial car wash or commercial service station. Companies with an automated on-site vehicle washing facility may washits vehicles at any time. Further, such washing may be exempt from these requirements if the health, safety, and welfare of the public are contingent upon frequent vehicle cleansing, such as garbage trucks and vehicles used to transport food and perishables.
- Discourage the filling, draining, or refilling of swimming pools, wading pools, hot
 tubs and Jacuzzi type pools except to maintain adequate water levels for structural
 integrity, proper operation and maintenance, and/or to alleviate an issue that poses a
 public safety risk. Users of these types of activates must notify the City of Willow
 Park beforehand.

City and Local Governments

In addition to the actions listed above:

- Review conditions and problems that caused Stage 1.
- Increase public education efforts on ways to reduce wateruse.
- Increase enforcement efforts.
- Intensify leak detection and repair efforts.

- Audit all city and local government irrigation systems to ensure proper condition, settings, and operation.
- Identify and encourage voluntary reduction measures by high-volume water users through water use audits.
- Reduce non-essential water use. As used herein, non-essential water uses are those
 that do not have any health or safety impact and are not needed to meet the core
 function of the agency.

Commercial or Industrial

- All actions listed above for all water users apply to commercial and industrial users.
- Stock at commercial plant nurseries is exempt from Stage 1 watering restrictions.
- Hotels, restaurants, and bars are encouraged to serve drinking water to patrons on an "on demand" basis.
- Hotels are encouraged to implement laundry conservation measures by encouraging patrons to reuse linens and towels.
- Car wash facilities must keep equipment in good working order, which should include regular inspections to be sure there are no leaks, broken or misdirected nozzles, and that all equipment is operating efficiently.
- All commercial and industrial customers are encouraged to audit irrigation systems

Stage 2 - Water Warning

Triggering Conditions for Stage 2

- City of Willow Park water demand reaches or exceeds 95% of reliable delivery capacity for a 24-hour period. The delivery capacity could be citywide or in a specified portion of the system.
- City of Willow Park's water distribution system becomes contaminated.
- City of Willow Park's water demand for all or part of the delivery system equals or exceeds delivery capacity because delivery capacity is inadequate.
- Water supply system is unable to deliver water due to the failure or damage of major water system components.
- City of Fort Worth initiates Stage 2.

Terminating Conditions for Stage 2

Stage 2 will terminate when the City of Fort Worth terminates its Stage 2 condition or when the circumstances that caused the initiation of Stage 2 (City of Willow Park water

supply) no longer prevail.

Goal for Use Reduction for Stage 2

The goal for water use reduction under Stage 2 – Water Warning is to decrease use by 10 percent. If circumstances warrant or if required by the City of Fort Worth, the Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee can set a goal for greater water use reduction.

Actions Available for Stage 2

The Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee may order the implementation of any of the actions listed below, as deemed necessary. The City Manager or his/her official designee must implement any action(s) required by the City of Fort Worth.

- Continue actions under Stage 1.
- Initiate engineering studies to evaluate water supply alternatives should conditions worsen.

All Water Users

- Limit landscape watering with sprinklers or irrigation systems to a once per week schedule at each service address as outlined below. This includes landscape watering at parks, golf courses, and sports fields.
 - Residential addresses ending in an even number (0, 2, 4, 6, or 8) may water on Saturday
 - Residential addresses ending in an odd number (1, 3, 5, 7 or 9) may water on Thursday
 - o All non-residential locations (apartment complexes, businesses, industries, parks, medians, etc.) may water on Tuesday
 - o No watering on Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Exceptions:

- Watering on any day by handheld hose, drip irrigation, a soaker hose or tree bubbler. This exception is exclusively for trees, shrubs and foundations.
- Outdoor watering at service addresses with large multi-station irrigation systems may take place in accordance with a variance granted by the director of utilities, if the director determines that a property cannot be completely irrigated with an average of three-quarters of an inch of water in a single day, and that the property should be divided into sections to be irrigated on different days. If approved, no station will be watered more than once per week.
- o If Golf courses using City of Willow Park water for irrigation may water greens and tee boxes as needed to keep them alive, however watering must

- be done before 10 a.m. and after 6 p.m. Fairways are restricted to once per week watering as outlined above. Golf course rough cannot be watered. (No golf courses on city water.)
- Watering of athletic fields (fields only, does not include surrounding landscaped areas) used for organized sports practice, competition, or exhibition events may occur as necessary to protect the health and safety of the players, staff, or officials present for athletic events. Encouraged to reduce water use by 10%.
- All users are encouraged to wait until the current drought or emergency situation has passed before establishing new landscaping and turf. After that, the watering restrictions set forth in this stage apply. (This does not include over seeding with rye (or other seasonal grass) since turf already exists.)
- Discourage the operation of ornamental fountains or ponds that use potable water except where necessary to support aquatic life or where such fountains or ponds are equipped with a recirculation system.
- Discourage the filling, draining, or refilling of swimming pools, wading pools, hot
 tubs and Jacuzzi type pools except to maintain adequate water levels for structural
 integrity, proper operation and maintenance, and/or to alleviate an issue that poses a
 public safety risk. Users of these types of activates must notify the City of Willow
 Park beforehand.

•

• Encourage the use of covers for all types of pools, hot tubs, and Jacuzzi type pools when not in use.

City and Local Governments

- Review conditions or problems that caused Stage 2. Take corrective action.
- Increase frequency of media releases on water supply conditions.
- Further accelerate public education efforts on ways to reduce wateruse.
- Eliminate non-essential water use. As used herein, non-essential water uses are those that do not have any health or safety impact and are not needed to meet the core function of the agency.
- Prohibit wet street sweeping.

Commercial or Industrial

- All actions listed above for all water users apply to commercial and industrial users.
- Use of water from fire hydrants for any purpose other than firefighting related activities or other activities necessary to maintain public health, safety and welfare requires a variance issued by the Willow Park City Manager or his/her official

designee. Fire hydrant use may be limited to only designated hydrants.

Stage 3 - Emergency Water Use

Triggering Conditions for Stage 3

- City of Willow Park water demand has reached or exceeds 98% of reliable delivery capacity for a 24 hour period. The delivery capacity could be citywide or in a specified portion of the system.
- City of Willow Park's water distribution system becomes contaminated.
- City of Willow Park's water demand for all or part of the delivery system exceeds delivery capacity because delivery capacity is inadequate.
- Willow Park's water supply system is unable to deliver water due to the failure or damage of major water system components.
- City of Fort Worth has initiated Stage 3 Emergency Water Use

Terminating Conditions for Stage 3

Stage 3 will terminate when the City of Fort Worth terminates its Stage 3 condition or when the circumstances that caused the initiation of Stage 3 no longer prevail.

Goals for Use Reduction for Stage 3

The goal for water use reduction under Stage 3, Emergency Water Use, is to decrease use by 20 percent. If circumstances warrant or if required by the City of Fort Worth, the Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee can set a goal for a greater water use reduction.

Actions Available for Stage 3

The Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee may order the implementation of any of the actions listed below, as deemed necessary. The City of Willow Park Manager or his/her official designee must implement any action(s) required by the City of Fort Worth.

• Continue or initiate any actions available under Stages 1 and 2.

All Water Users

- Prohibit landscape watering, including at parks, golf courses, and sports fields.
 Exceptions:
 - Watering with hand-held hose, soaker hose or drip irrigation system may occur any day and anytime. (The intent of this measure is to allow for the protection of structural foundations, trees, and other high value landscape

materials).

- o If golf courses that use City of Willow Park water for irrigation: greens only may be watered by hand-held hose as needed to keep them alive.
- Watering of athletic fields (fields only, does not include surrounding landscaped areas) used for organized sports practice, competition, or exhibition events may occur as necessary to protect the health and safety of the players, staff, or officials present for athletic events may be allowed to water by variance. A water management plan must be submitted to the Willow Park City Manager detailing how each area will comply with stage 3 drought measures.
- Prohibit establishment of new landscaping. Variances <u>may</u> be granted for those landscape projects started prior to the initiation of stage 3 droughtrestrictions.
- Vehicle washing restricted to commercial car wash, commercial service station or a
 private on-site vehicle washing facility and can only be done as necessary for health,
 sanitation, or safety reasons, including but not limited to the washing of garbage
 trucks and vehicles used to transport food and other perishables. All other vehicle
 washing is prohibited.
- Prohibit the operation of ornamental fountains or ponds that use potable water except where necessary to support aquatic life.
- Prohibit the draining, filling, or refilling of swimming pools, wading pools and Jacuzzi type pools. Existing private and public pools may add water to maintain pool levels; however, they may not be refilled using automatic fill valves. Users of these types of activates must notify the City of Willow Park beforehand.
- Prohibit hosing of buildings or other structures for purposes other than fire protection or surface preparation prior to painting with high-pressure equipment. Must be performed by a professional power washing service utilizing high efficiency equipment and a vacuum recovery system where possible.

City and Local Governments

In addition to actions listed above:

- Continue or initiate any actions available under Stages 1 and 2.
- Review conditions or problems that caused Stage 3. Take corrective action.
- Implement viable alternative water supply strategies.
- Increase frequency of media releases explaining emergency situation.
- Reduce city and local government water use to maximum extentpossible.
- Prohibit the permitting of new swimming pools, Jacuzzi type pools, spas, ornamental ponds and fountain construction. Pools already permitted and under construction may be completely filled with water.

Commercial or Industrial

- All actions listed above for all water users apply to commercial and industrial users.
- Hotels, restaurants, and bars required to serve drinking water to patrons on an "on demand" basis.
- Hotels are required to implement laundry conservation measures by encouraging patrons to reuse linens and towels.
- Stock at commercial plant nursery may be watered only with a hand-held hose, hand-held watering can, or drip irrigation system.
- Commercial and industrial water users required to reduce water use by a set percentage determined by the Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee.
- Use of water from hydrants for any purpose other than firefighting related activities or other activities necessary to maintain public health, safety and welfare requires a special permit issued by the Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee. Fire hydrant use may be limited to only designated hydrants.

4.5 Procedures for Granting Variances to the Plan

The Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee may grant temporary variances for existing water uses otherwise prohibited under this drought contingency plan if one or more of the following conditions are met:

- Failure to grant such a variance would cause an emergency condition adversely affecting health, sanitation, or fire safety for the public or the person requesting the variance.
- Compliance with this plan cannot be accomplished due to technical orother limitations.
- Alternative methods that achieve the same level of reduction in water use can be implemented.

Variances shall be granted or denied at the discretion of the Willow Park City Manager or his/her official designee. All petitions for variances should be in writing, using the forms provided, and must include the following information:

- Name and address of the petitioner(s)
- Purpose of water use
- Specific provisions from which relief is requested
- Detailed statement of the adverse effect of the provision from which relief is requested
- Description of the relief requested
- Period of time for which the variance is sought

- Detailed schedule of irrigation that shows a reduction in use over the 30 day period for new lawns and landscapes. Schedule should be designed so that at the end of the 30 day period, lawn and landscaped areas can adhere to the twice per weekschedule defined in Stage 1.
- Alternative measures that will be taken to reduce water use
- Other pertinent information.

4.6 Procedures for Enforcing Mandatory Water Use Measures

Mandatory water use restrictions may be imposed in Stages 1, 2, and 3. These mandatory water use restrictions will be enforced by warnings and penalties as follows:

- On the first violation, customers will be given a written warning that they have violated the mandatory water use restriction.
- On the second and subsequent violations, citations may be issued to customers, with minimum and maximum fines established by ordinance.
- After three violations have occurred, the utility may cut off water service to the customer.

Appendix B contains a copy of the City of Willow Park City ordinance adopting this Plan and the enforcement actions and penalties.

4.7 Coordination with the Other Entities

Appendix C includes a copy of a letters sent to the chair of the Region C Water Planning Group, General Manager of TRWD and the Executive Director or TCEQ upon adoption of this Plan.

4.8 Review and Update of Drought Contingency Plan

As required by TCEQ rules, the City of Willow Park will review this drought contingency plan at least every five years. The plan will be updated as appropriate based on new or updated information.

5.0 <u>Drought Contingency Plan Definitions</u>

Term	Definition
Aesthetic water use	Water use for ornamental or decorative features such as fountains, reflecting pools and water gardens.
Alternative Water Source	Means water produced by a source other than a water treatment plan and in not considered potable. These sources can include, but are not limited to: reclaimed/recycled water, collected rain water, collected grey water, private well water.
Athletic field	Means a sports playing field, the essential feature of which is turf grass, used primarily for organized sports for schools, professional sports, or sanctioned league play.
Automatic Irrigation System	Means a site specific system of delivering water generally for landscaping via a system of pipes or other conduits installed below ground that automatically cycles water use through water emitters to a preset program, whether on a designated timer or through manual operation.
Aquatic Life	Means a vertebrate organism dependent upon an aquatic environment to sustain its life.
Conservation	Those practices, techniques, and technologies that reduce water consumption; reduce the loss or waste of water; improve the efficiency in water use; and increase the recycling and reuse of water so that supply is conserved and made available for other or future uses.
Customer	Any person, company, or organization using water supplied by TRWD or through an entity supplied by TRWD.
Drip irrigation	An irrigation system (drip, porous pipe, etc.) that applies water at a predetermined controlled low-flow levels directly to the roots of the plant
Drought Contingency Plan	Means a strategy or combination of strategies for temporary supply management and demand management responses to temporary or potentially recurring water supply shortages and other water supply emergencies.

Fountain	An artificially created jet, stream or flow of water, a structure, often decorative, from which a jet, stream or flow of water issues.
Golf Course	Means an irrigated and landscaped playing area made up of greens, tees, fairways, roughs and related areas used for the playing of golf.
Hand-held hose	Means a hose physically held by one person, fitted with a manual or automatic shutoff nozzle.
Hand Watering	Means the application of water for irrigation purposes through a hand-held watering hose, watering can, or bucket.
Hose-end Sprinkler	Means a device through which water flows from a hose to a sprinkler to water any lawn or landscape.
Hosing	Means to spray, water, or wash with a water hose.
Industrial water use	Means the use of water for or in connection with commercial or industrial activities, including but not limited to, manufacturing, bottling, brewing, food processing, scientific research and technology, recycling, production of concrete, asphalt, and cement, commercial uses of water for tourism, entertainment, and hotel or motel lodging, generation of power other than hydroelectric and other business activities.
Irrigation system	Means a system of fixed pipes and water emitters that apply water to landscape plants or turfgrass, including, but not limited to, in-ground and permanent irrigation systems.
Lake, lagoon or pond	Means an artificially created body of fresh or salt water.

Landscape irrigation use	Water used for the irrigation and maintenance of landscaped areas, whether publicly
	or privately owned, including residential and commercial lawns, gardens, golf courses, parks, right-of-ways, medians and entry ways.
"New landscape" means	a. Installed during construction of a new house, multi-family dwelling, or commercial building;
	 b. Installed as part of a governmental entity's capital improvement project; or c. Alters more than one-half the area of an existing landscape.
Non-essential water use	Water uses that are not required for the protection of public health, safety and welfare, such as:
	 a. Irrigating landscape areas, including parks, athletic fields, and golfcourses, except as otherwise provided under this plan;
	 Washing any sidewalks, walkways, driveways, parking lots, tennis courts, or other hard-surfaced areas; except to alleviate a public health and safety issue;
	 c. Washing any automobile, motorbike, boat (and/or trailer), airplane, or other vehicle except where required by law for safety and sanitary purposes. d. Washing buildings or structures for purposes other than immediate fire
	protection, or other uses provided under this plan; e. Filling, refilling, or adding to any swimming pools or Jacuzzi-type pools, except to maintain safe operating levels;
	f. Filling or operation of a fountain or pond for aesthetic or scenic purposes except when necessary to support aquatic life;
	 g. Failure to repair a controllable leak within a reasonable time period after being directed to do so by formal notice; and h. Drawing from hydrants for construction purposes or any other purposeother
	than firefighting or protection of public drinking water supplies.
Park	Means a non-residential or multifamily tract of land, other than a golf course, maintained by a city, private organization, or individual, as a place of beauty or public recreation and available for use to the general public.
Power/Pressure washer	Means a machine that uses water or a water-based product applied at high pressure to clean impervious surfaces.
Pressure washer (High-Efficiency)	Means a machine that uses water or a water-based product applied at 1500 pounds per square inch (PSI) or greater.
Reclaimed Water	Municipal wastewater effluent that is given additional treatment and distributed for reuse in certain applications. Also referred to as recycled water.

Soaker hose	Means a flexible hose that is designed to slowly emit water across the entire length and connect directly to a flexible hose or spigot. Does not include hose that by design or use sends a fine spray in the air. It is not considered drip irrigation.
Splash Pad/Spray Park	Means an area for water play that has no standing water. Typically, they utilize various spray nozzles which spray water in multiple directions.
Swimming pool	Means any structure, basin, chamber, or tank including hot tubs, containing an artificial body of water for swimming, diving, or recreational bathing, and having a depth of two (2) feet or more at any point.
Vegetable garden	Means any noncommercial vegetable garden planted primarily for household use; "noncommercial" includes incidental direct selling of produce from such a vegetable garden to the public.
Well Water	Means water that has been, or is, obtained from the ground by digging, boring, or drilling to access an underground aquifer.





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
